TITLE: FOURTH AND FINAL PUBLIC HEARING REGARDING THE DECENNIAL CITY COUNCIL REDISTRICTING PROCESS BASED ON RECENTLY RELEASED 2020 US CENSUS POPULATION DATA FOR THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendations: That the City Council:

- 1. Receive a presentation from the City's redistricting consultants regarding proposed redistricting maps;
- Conduct the final public hearing of the four State-mandated public hearings regarding the proposed redistricting maps in light of the 2020 Census, pursuant to Elections Code Sections 21601-21609;
- 3. Select a preferred district map for use until the 2030 Census, unless changes are permitted prior to the 2030 Census under applicable law at the time; and
- Approve Resolution No. 2022-____, repealing the City's existing district boundaries, contingent upon the adoption of an alternative preferred map, by a majority of the City Council based on the 2020 census as required by California Elections Code sections 21601-21609

SUMMARY

Members of the Moreno Valley City Council are elected using "by-district" elections, meaning elections in which a candidate for the Council may only run for office in the district in which he or she resides and is elected only by the voters in that district.

State law (Elections Code §§ 21600-21609) requires that any city using district elections to review its district boundaries upon the release of the decennial U.S. Census, to determine whether the boundaries need to be adjusted in accordance with federal equal population requirements. This process must be done in accordance with the Federal Voting Rights Act, the Equal Protection Clause, and applicable State law.

This is the fourth and final of the four State-mandated public hearings related to the Redistricting Process that are intended to provide the public with a meaningful opportunity to comment and to submit maps related to the Redistricting Process for consideration by the City Council.

It is important to note that even though it may appear to some that no changes may be required, the City is still required to go this process regardless. Moreover, the Redistricting Process is not the appropriate forum to address any change in the number of council members; this issue must be addressed in the context of the initiative process as a ballot measure for the voters to decide.

BACKGROUND

In 2019, the State Legislature enacted AB 849 and AB 1276, which substantially rewrote the State law provisions governing the Redistricting Process as it relates to cities. The new law requires a significantly more detailed public process, including requirements for more public hearings; new notice and public outreach requirements; translation requirements; the creation and maintenance (for ten years) of a redistricting website, etc. The City has already established the required website at redistrictmoval.org.

The new law also limits the discretion that city councils previously had in determining the redistricting criteria to be applied under State law, and instead prescribes specific criteria that the City Council must follow and sets the priority to be given to each criterion.

DISCUSSION

A. Substantive Requirements

The official adjusted¹ 2020 population of Moreno Valley is 209,667, and the ideal district size is 52,417 total persons. The populations of the current districts as reflected in the adjusted Census data are as follows:

District 1:	50,844
District 2:	51,719
District 3:	53,474
District 4:	53,630

¹ Pursuant to State law, the population as reflected in the Census must be adjusted to redistribute incarcerated prisoners back to their last known place of pre-incarceration residence. See Elec. Code § 21601(a). Those are the data addressed herein.

The Supreme Court has held that there does not have to be perfect equality amongst the district populations, but a plan with a "total deviation" exceeding 10% is presumed to be unconstitutionally malapportioned. The "total deviation" is calculated by determining the difference in population between the largest and smallest districts and then dividing by the ideal population.

Applying that formula, we subtract the population of District 1 (the least populated, 3.00% below the ideal) from the population of District 4 (the most populated, 2.31% above the ideal) to get a range of 2,786. Dividing that range by the ideal population of 52,417, the "total deviation" of the City's current district plan is 5.32%—which is way within the permissible 10% range.

However, under State law there are additional criteria that must be complied with. State law requires that the districts conform to the following:

- 1) The districts must be "substantially equal in population" as defined by the Supreme Court (*i.e.*, within the 10% range discussed above).
- 2) The districts must comply with the Federal Voting Rights Act of 1965 (52 U.S.C. Sec. 10301 et seq.).
- 3) The districts must comply with constitutional restrictions on "racial gerrymandering.
- Subject to the constitutional and federal law requirements noted in paragraphs (1) – (3), voting districts must be established according to four statutory criteria, ranked in order of priority:
 - To the extent practicable, council districts shall be geographically contiguous. Areas that meet only at the points of adjoining corners are not contiguous. Areas that are separated by water and not connected by a bridge, tunnel, or regular ferry service are not contiguous.
 - To the extent practicable, the geographic integrity of any local neighborhood or local Community of Interest shall be respected in a manner that minimizes its division. A "Community of Interest" is a population that shares common social or economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation. Communities of Interest do not include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates.
 - Council district boundaries should be easily identifiable and understandable by residents. To the extent practicable, council districts shall be bounded by natural and artificial barriers, by streets, or by the boundaries of the City.

• To the extent practicable, and where it does not conflict with the preceding criteria in this subdivision, council districts shall be drawn to encourage geographical compactness in a manner that nearby areas of population are not bypassed in favor of more distant populations.

All of the maps, including the current district map, that will be presented to the Council at the public hearing comply with numbers 1-3, so the choice of map will necessarily turn on the question of which best applies the criteria listed in number 4, although a map with a lower total deviation is not any more legally defensible than another with a higher deviation, so long as both maps are within the 10% threshold discussed above and the deviation results from the pursuit of legitimate redistricting goals.

B. Process

Under the pertinent State laws as amended by AB 849 and AB 1276 (in 2019), the City Council is required to conduct at least four public hearings prior to adopting an updated district boundary map. At least one such hearing must be held prior to the drafting of possible mapping alternatives, and at least two must be held after the drafting of possible mapping options.

This is the fourth and final of the four State-mandated public hearings. This public hearing was originally scheduled for March 15, 2022, but had to be rescheduled to April 5, 2022, due the lack of a quorum. As such, new public hearing notices were prepared, posted and distributed as required by all applicable City policies and state laws. Staff also posted a notice of cancellation of the March 15 public hearing on the City's redistricting website and other appropriate places accessible to the public. The legal deadline to complete this process is April 17, 2022. The previous required public hearings were held on February 1 and February 15, 2022, and March 1, 2022.

Per State law, the hearings must be conducted at a specific time; this hearing is noticed to begin at 6:00 p.m. The chief purpose of this final public hearing is to receive public and Council feedback on proposed mapping options.

The draft maps are available on the City's redistricting website at redistrictmoval.org.

ALTERNATIVES

The City Council has the following alternatives:

- 1. <u>Conduct the public hearing and adopt a final district map for use in November</u> <u>2022 and subsequent elections</u>. This alternative will comply with State law and allow the City Council and the City's consultants to receive feedback from the public regarding the adjustment of district boundaries in light of the 2020 Census.
- 2. <u>Do not conduct the public hearing</u>. If the process required by State law is not completed by the legal deadline, responsibility for redrawing the council districts shifts to the Riverside County Superior Court.

RESOLUTION NO. 2022-___

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, REPEALING THE CITY'S EXISTING CITY COUNCIL MEMBER DISTRICT BOUNDARIES, CONTINGENT UPON THE ADOPTION OF AN ALTERNATIVE PREFERRED MAP BY A MAJORITY OF THE CITY COUNCIL BASED ON THE 2020 CENSUS AS REQUIRED BY CALIFORNIA ELECTIONS CODE SECTIONS 21601-21609

WHEREAS, on June 10, 2014, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 879, submitting to the voters of the City the question of whether to adopt a separately elected Mayor with four city council members elected "by districts"; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 879 also proposed the four city council districts to take effect upon approval by the City's voters; and

WHEREAS, on November 4, 2014, a majority of the voters of the City of Moreno Valley voted in the affirmative on Measure R, thereby adopting Ordinance No. 879; and

WHEREAS, the city council districts contained in Ordinance No. 879 were used in the 2016, 2018, and 2020 regular elections; and

WHEREAS, California's FAIR MAPS Act, Elections Code sections 21600 to 21609 requires that any general law city that elects the members of its council "by districts" evaluate those districts following the release of the decennial census to ensure "that the council districts shall be substantially equal in population as required by the United States Constitution"; and

WHEREAS, the United States Supreme Court has held that a "total deviation" under 10% is presumptively constitutional; and

WHEREAS, the existing city council districts have a "total deviation" of population between the districts of 5.32% based on the 2020 Census; and

WHEREAS, under changes to state law adopted by the Legislature in 2019, there are additional criteria that must be complied with, including contiguity, minimizing division of neighborhoods and communities of interest to the extent possible, following easily understandable boundaries to the extent possible, and encouraging the compactness of population to the extent practicable; and

WHEREAS, the Census Bureau released the final redistricting data on August 12, 2021; and

WHEREAS, the California Statewide Database released an "adjusted" version of those data as required by Elections Code section 21601(a)(2) on September 21, 2021, and released a corrected version of those "adjusted" data on September 27, 2021; and

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Resolution No. 2022-____ Date Adopted: April 5, 2022 **WHEREAS**, the City has retained an experienced redistricting/demographic consulting firm, National Demographics Corporation (NDC), and experienced legal counsel, Nielsen Merksamer, to advise it on the process of preparing a revised district plan; and

WHEREAS, on February 1, 2022, the City Council conducted its first duly-noticed public hearing to receive public testimony regarding the composition of the districts, especially communities of interest after receiving information regarding the final "adjusted" demographics of the existing districts based on the SWDB data, the redistricting process, and the legal and policy criteria governing redistricting, after which; and

WHEREAS, on February 15, 2022, the City Council conducted a second dulynoticed public hearing at its regular city council meeting to receive public testimony regarding the composition of the districts and instructed its consultants to prepare draft maps for consideration at future public hearings; and

WHEREAS, on March 1, 2022, the City Council conducted a third duly-noticed public hearing at its regular city council meeting, wherein the City's consultants presented four draft council district plans to the City Council—the existing lines, which, as noted above, remain population-balanced—and three maps submitted by members of the public (Public Maps 101, 102, and 103); and

WHEREAS, the fourth and final public hearing which was originally scheduled for March 15, 2022, had to be rescheduled to April 5, 2022, due the lack of a quorum, new public hearing notices were prepared, posted and distributed as required by all applicable City policies and state laws to reflect that the fourth and final public hearing was scheduled for April 5, 2022; and

WHEREAS, on April 5, 2022, the City Council conducted the fourth and final dulynoticed public hearing at its regular city council meeting regarding the draft maps considered at the March 1 hearing plus nine additional maps submitted by members of the public; and

WHEREAS, throughout this process the City has maintained a detailed redistricting website as required by law, at https://redistrictmoval.org/; and

WHEREAS, the City has provided notices and other materials in Spanish, and has provided translation services upon request; and

WHEREAS, the City has engaged in good-faith public outreach to community groups and other interested parties as required by law; and

WHEREAS, the City made online mapping tools available to the public, to permit them to submit draft maps if so desired;

WHEREAS, the City Council has considered all public comments on the proposed council district plans; and

WHEREAS, the City Council believes that the districts contained in ______ (the "Preferred Map"), incorporated herein, would best serve the interests of the City and the public at large; and

WHEREAS, the populations in the proposed districts of the Preferred Map are substantially equal in compliance with legal requirements; and

WHEREAS, Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act, 52 U.S.C. § 10301 prohibits the use of any voting qualification, or prerequisite to voting, or standard, practice, or procedure in a manner which results in a denial or abridgement of the right of any citizen of the United States to vote on account of race or color, and the Preferred Map complies with section 2 of the Voting Rights Act; and

WHEREAS, the districts as depicted in the Preferred Map are each geographically contiguous; and

WHEREAS, the Preferred Map seeks to minimize the division of communities of interest and neighborhoods to the extent possible; and

WHEREAS, the Preferred Map uses easily understandable boundaries, like streets, natural and artificial barriers, and the boundaries of the City, to the extent possible; and

WHEREAS, the Preferred Map is drawn to encourage geographical compactness to the extent practicable; and

WHEREAS, Elections Code section 20601(a) that following each federal decennial census for a city, the city may adopt boundaries for all of the council districts of the city by resolution.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. ADOPTION OF PREFERRED MAP

That pursuant to California Elections Code section 21601 and Municipal Code section 2.02.040, the City Council prefers the district boundaries in (the "Preferred Map"), attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by this reference; believes that its adoption would be serve the public interest of the City's residents and voters; and by this Resolution hereby adopts the district boundaries in the Preferred Map for use at the City's November 2022 election and subsequent elections until a further re-alignment is required pursuant to Elections Code section 21601 and Municipal Code section 2.02.040, following the release of the

Page 3 Resolution No. 2022-___ Date Adopted: April 5, 2022 2030 Census, or unless changes are approved prior to the 2030 Census pursuant to the applicable laws in place at the time.

Section 2. CONTINUING EFFECT

That, notwithstanding Section 1 of this Ordinance, and in accordance with Elections Code section 21606, the district boundaries adopted by Ordinance No. 879 shall remain effective for purposes of filling vacancies in office until the next regularly-scheduled election for each district

Section 3. IMPLEMENTATION

(1) That the City Manager and/or his designee shall take all actions necessary to notify the Riverside County Registrar's Office of the City Council's determination forthwith and provide whatever assistance may be required by the Registrar's Office to implement the new boundary lines.

(2) That because the new district plan may contain technical anomalies caused by errors in the 2020 Census line files that do not substantively affect the populations in the districts, the district boundaries, or the intent of this Resolution, which anomalies are not revealed until implementation begins, the City Manager and/or designee is authorized to make technical emendations to the new plan that do not substantively affect the populations in the districts, the district boundaries, or the intent of this Resolution, and shall advise the City Council of any such emendations that are found to be required in plan implementation by the County Registrar's Office.

(3) That the City Manager shall consult with legal counsel and/or the City's demographic consultant as necessary to resolve any legal or technical issues necessary to give effect to this Resolution.

Section 4. CONFLICTING MEASURES

That to the extent that the terms and provisions of this Resolution may be inconsistent or in conflict with the terms or conditions of any prior City ordinance, motion, resolution, rule or regulation governing the same subject, the terms of this Resolution shall prevail with respect to the subject matter thereof.

Section 5. INTERPRETATION

That in interpreting this Resolution or resolving any ambiguity, this Resolution shall be interpreted in a manner that effectively accomplishes its stated purposes.

Section 6. SEVERABILITY

That if any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Resolution, is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Resolution. 

(Map of City Council Districts - 2020 Census)


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
